THE PENNSYLVANIA EMSC PROGRAM

PA's EMSC Advisory Council Purpose and Composition

Almost 30 percent of Pennsylvania's population is comprised of children. Pennsylvania's Emergency Medical Services for Children (EMSC) program is based on a federal initiative designed to reduce child and youth disability and death due to illness and injury.

The EMSC committee of the Pennsylvania Emergency Health Services Council (PEHSC) serves as a forum for issues that have a potential impact on the emergency care and transport of all pediatric patients in the Commonwealth; to educate prehospital providers, other health practitioners, and the general public in regard to provision of services available through the EMSC program; to formulate recommendations to the Board of Directors of the PEHSC, which reflect the interest and opinion of pediatric emergency care providers and injury prevention professionals.

The EMSC committee is composed of physicians, nurses, prehospital providers, injury prevention advocates, and other healthcare and EMS professionals. There are no stipulations for membership on the committee, so if you are interested in becoming involved with the EMSC program, contact PEHSC by visiting their website at www.pehsc.org.

The Committee, relying on the expertise of its members, considers issues and develops recommendations for consideration by the Board of Directors. Once these recommendations are approved by the Board of Directors, they are forwarded to the Pennsylvania Department of Health as official PEHSC positions on EMS issues.

PA's EMSC Projects

Some recent accomplishments of the PA EMSC Program:

- Every school district in Pennsylvania was provided with a copy of the Emergency Guidelines for Schools, which was provided by the Ohio EMSC program and offers guidelines for helping an ill or injured student when the school nurse or other healthcare provider is not available. This can also be downloaded from our website at www.pehsc.org.
- EMSC representation was added to the statewide medical advisory committee so that pediatric concerns and considerations can be addressed when developing treatment protocols.
- Each ambulance service was provided with a pediatric stethoscope at no cost to them to bring them into compliance with the current list of required ambulance equipment.
- Each ambulance service was provided with two complimentary educational DVDs: "A Child in Need" and "On the Same Team." Continuing education credits were also made available via the Learning Management System (LMS) for those who watched the DVDs and took the associated exam.

Current Projects of the EMSC Program

- The surveying and inspection of ambulances across the Commonwealth to ensure their compliance with the nationally recognized pediatric equipment list
- The surveying of the ambulance services and providers to validate the availability and use of pediatric-specific online and offline medical direction since the inception of statewide protocols, which call for the availability of pediatric medical direction.

- The identification of pediatric specialty centers and to ensure that they have appropriate guidelines and agreements in place for the transfer of pediatric patients between facilities.
- Increasing the availability of pediatric specific continuing education for the field providers' recertification. Pediatric courses are available at the annual statewide EMS conference.
- The establishment and maintenance of an EMS for Children website, which provides visitors with additional resources and information about the EMSC program.

The following were notable observations from the update and analysis of the pediatric data as supplied by Pennsylvania's ambulance services:

- ❖ The highest frequency reason for a pediatric ambulance call was medical (44%) followed by vehicular accidents (16%); this was consistent with prior years.
- ❖ Medical command was used in 42% of the ambulance calls for pediatric patients with most of the authorization received through the use of protocols and standing orders.
- ❖ The most frequent ALS pediatric treatment was EKG (20%) followed by peripheral IV initiation (14%).
- ❖ The total number of pediatric patients seen by ambulance services was 106,964.

THE FEDERAL EMSC PROGRAM AND HISTORY OF EMSC

Early EMS systems were designed to provide rapid intervention for sudden cardiac arrest in adults and rapid transport for motor vehicle crash victims. There was limited recognition that children required specialized care as well. In 1984, the first EMSC legislation was passed and the EMSC program was established. Since the development of the program, all 50 States, the District of Columbia, and several territories have received funding to support pediatric initiatives.

Since its establishment, the EMSC program has improved the availability of child-appropriate equipment in ambulances and emergency departments, supported injury prevention programs, and provided thousands of hours of training to EMTs, paramedics, and other emergency medical care providers.

The Federal EMSC program has developed several goals for each state to implement in an effort to improve the care provided to pediatric patients. These goals are regularly updated and changed to better serve the needs of America's youth. The current performance measures have been designed to address the following issues, just to name a few:

- Availability of on- and off-line medical control
- Availability of pediatric-specific equipment
- Identification of hospitals who are best able to treat pediatric patients
- Development and use of interfacility transfer guidelines and agreements for the transfer of pediatric patients
- Establishment of provider education and recertification requirements
- Integration of EMSC priorities into state EMS systems and regulations
